On Sunday, April 9, the Cotati Historical Society once again hosted a sell-out crowd at this year's ninth annual Old-Fashioned Chicken BBO at the Cotati Community Center next to City Hall. The now traditional event ensures the continued care of the city's historical collection, overall management of the Cotati Museum, and the support of educational and cultural activities in and around Cotati.


"It's a labor of love for our members and other community volunteers," said John Allred, president of the nonprofit historical society and master of ceremonies. "We spend nearly six months each year planning, executing, and wrapping up what is really a small-town reunion for current and former Cotatians."

Volunteers manage not just the barbecue, but a vintage car show, sweets sale, beverage bar, 50/50 raffle, the Thomas Page Academy history-writing award ceremony, and a silent auction of local gifts, art, services, and handcrafts.

"Without the support of interested individuals, organizations, and businesses, the membership could never hope to get all the work done alone," said John.

"Not only does the weekend of the event require a disciplined team setting up, cooking, serving, and cleaning up," added society vice president Sandra Walton. "It takes dozens of hours spent by dozens of volunteers throughout the year to make this happen and to support fellow cultural nonprofits. We sort of rest in the summer by participating in parades and festivals organized by other community groups. In fall, we also hold a history or museum-related event."

BBQ chair and chef Ed Gilardi reports that the 2017 barbecue dished up 340 chicken halves, 14 gallons of beans, 36 dozen rolls, and 80 pounds of cole slaw. Joe Panfiglio helped Ed tend the early morning-to-late-afternoon grills along with











Ed's son Anthony, and three generations of the ever-reliable Martins: Bruce, Gary, and Jake. Steadfast food and supply donors were Oliver's Market, Larsen's Feed, Bay Cities Produce, United Markets, and Lagunitas Brewery.

"We had 20 people make goodies for the bake sale," reported chair Judy Gustafson. "There were eight pies, seven cakes, assorted breads and muffins, and about 30 dozen cookies, brownies, and bars, and we sold out of everything." Her volunteer team—including Diane Canadas, Lisa Moore, Judy Pagnusat, Shelby Gustafson, Bette McKnight, and Ellen Ostrand—also sold 100 jars of the highly prized organic jams made specially for the event by Gustafson and Connie Martin.

Connie herself was here, there, and everywhere, making sure things were running smoothly—as she does each year.

The event's dining, sales, and dance areas, once limited to the Cotati Room, now spread across outdoor sun and shade spots to the Stony Point Room, accommodating more than 400 guests. Local band Take Your Medicine inspired many to dance in the sunlit open space.

Annual car show impresario Gary Santero rounded up seven oh-so-shiny vintage models, plus a copy of the police car from the movie *American Graffiti*, provided by nonprofit Cruisin' The Boulevard's annual salute to the classic film.

The Thomas Page Academy History Essay winner this year was Angelica Aguilar Lopez; runners up were: Zuri Ruiz, Aaliyah Salgado, Cali Figoni, and Kimberly Pineda. Presenting the awards were Velma DiMeola and Marie McNaughton.

Silent auction chair Bobbie Veronda reported that of the 173 items collected and presented for auction, 80 local businesses and individuals contributed, many with multiple items. "It's not just longtime Cotatians who participate, but new businesses also get a chance to attract the attention of hundreds of guests," said Bobbie.
