VOLUNTEERS HELPED **BEAUTIFY OUR PLAZA**

Back in 1893, when the Page family had their big ranch surveyed and a town named Cotati designed, its heart was a plaza surrounded by streets named for six sons of Thomas Stokes Page. Reason for the hexagonal design is a mystery, but the Pages ordered that it remain a public park to belong to the people of Cotati.

The Plaza has always been the heart of the community – center of the little town's business district; for several years the home of a small herd of deer that entertained passers-by; the locale where the St. Joseph's Parish held its huge annual barbecues; the

place where the people of the community placed monuments to honor very special deceased citizens; site for the annual Accordion and Jazz Festivals, and in recent years, a demonstration garden illustrating water-conserving plantings.

But in spite of its importance to Cotati, there were many years when the hexagonal park was a park in name only, except for the one section where the American Legion had erected a flagpole in memory of WWI servicemen. Native weeds grew around the trees and little attention was paid to it except now and then when a special occasion was planned. Everybody was busy with his or her own ranch or business.

But toward the end of the 1950's, things began to change. Rohnert Park had started growing, with elaborate plans for the community it was to become; Cotatians developed a new sense of pride in their town with its efficient fire department, diverse businesses and an energetic Public Utility District that had produced a water and sewage system, street lights and even some sidewalks.

The public land that was the Plaza had been a county responsibility for years. In 1959, discouraged with the lack of upkeep, the Cotati Chamber of Commerce, always a sparkplug for progress in the town in those days, appealed to the county for help. Bill Kortum, chamber president, convinced the supervisors to spend \$400, promising it would be augmented by citizen contributions, to plant lowmaintenance shrubs in one section and rye grass lawn in the other five.

A citizens' group called the Cotati Civic Improvement Committee, led by H.W. "Bud" Howard, a local farm equipment dealer, began landscaping. Dr. John Roberts became chairman of a new club called the Keep the Plaza Green Club.

Plaza

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established to raise money to buy a power mower and a traveling sprinkler system.

Club volunteers sent out letters to every household in Cotati asking for donations. The Chamber and the Lions Club, also a leader in Cotati's civic life, each pledged \$100, a princely sum in 1960. Donors were asked to send their contributions – any amount – to

Harold Griffith, the club treasurer, with the promise that they would not only help beautify the plazas but they would receive a membership card and would get their names in the local weekly newspaper,



and would get their Keep the Plaza Green membership card.

The Cotatian. The goal was \$2000.

There were posters around town that said "You don't have to die to get your name in *The Cotatian*!" One wag doctored the one in Sophus Jensen's blacksmith shop, (now Dos Amigos Restaurant) adding a P.S. that said: "But it helps!" Contributions poured in, and workers got busy.

A local builder, Vladimer "Bill" Budinsky, produced a picnic table and benches for one Plaza section, and other business owners contributed such items as hardware, concrete and welding.

Two years later, when the urge to incorporate Cotati as a city became overpowering, the newly beautified Plaza was a gathering place for incorporation proponents. A rally with a big bonfire, a band, free wieners,

donuts and coffee attracted more than enough people to swing the election, easing fears of an underground anti-incorporation effort. After the successful incorporation election on July 3, 1963, another big party was held at the firehouse, overflowing into the Plaza, to celebrate the end of what had been a year-long campaign.

Soon after the new little city became official, the city council petitioned the county to turn over the Plaza to the city. In 1965, Supervisor Leigh Shoemaker officially presented the deed to the Plaza to Mayor Stanley Olsson, and the Plaza, ever since, has been improved and carefully protected as a major city asset.

their entries for our annual essay contest about Thomas Page and his family in early Cotati.






