#### THE CHS MISSION

## **Thomas Page Academy Fourth Graders Learn Cotati History & City Operations**

Each school year California fourth graders study California history. (Remember your Franciscan mission project?) Here in Cotati, the tradition has come to include a visit to City Hall, the Police Department, and to our museum. The adventure covers two topics: early Cotati history and how city departments work together.

This February 14, 44 Thomas Page students, their teachers Mira Patel and Kiyoko Nakano, and their parent chaperones assembled in Cotati's city council chambers to meet their volunteer tour guides and speakers. The visitors then split into four smaller groups to see a history slide show in the chambers, compete in a treasure hunt in the museum, and learn about public works, finance, and city planning and management.

This was followed by a behind-the-scenes view of police department dispatching and report writing. Kids also climbed in and around prisoner holding cells, cars, and other equipment.

Back at school, students then practiced their writing skills to compose essays about local land and history, especially of Rancho Cotate owner Thomas Stokes

Page and his descendants.

During March, our contest judges will choose one winner and a few honorable mentions. This year's winner will receive \$50 personally and \$100 for his or her classroom.

At the annual CHS BBQ — Sunday, April 8, 2018 attendees will be able to read the chosen essays and see the winning student and teacher receive their prizes. All student honorees will receive personalized certificates.

This is the seventh CHS school tour and essay contest, for which numerous volunteers and school and city employees coordinate for months. CHS secretary and Cotati-Rohnert Park Unified School District veteran Velma DiMeola oversees the project. Velma taught kindergarten through fifth grade for 43 years, mostly at Evergreen Elementary School, sometimes at Thomas Page Academy.

## RIPPED from the headlines: 60 years ago in Cotati

On March 6, 1958, The Cotatian reported on the state of local crime.

"The two newspaper racks from the front of the Cotati Post Office disappeared over the weekend, apparently stolen for the small change in the coin boxes. Since these boxes are emptied almost every day, it's not likely the thief received much for his efforts.

"Local curiosity was aroused Monday when sheriff's officers appeared at the 8-Ball.

"They were investigating a car parked there which matched the description of a car used by a robbery suspect. It turned out to be wrong one, but the owner was shaken up so [sic] when confronted by the law that he went home with a 'package' to relax.

"The back of the Cotati School acquired a polka dot effect sometime over the weekend when quantities of mud were thrown on the new pink paint. It was apparently the work of youngsters playing on the school grounds."

## **Volunteer Profile: John Allred** Taking Care of "Future History"

John is beginning his third year as president of the Cotati Historical Society. Like so many others, he was introduced to the Historical Society by Lloyd and Prue Draper, and became an early member.

John's love for small towns is natural for him having grown up in Oakdale, Calif. His father was a cattle auctioneer and John may have inherited the auctioneering talent. He has used his skill for many years at the annual Historical Society Chicken BBQ, CHS's primary fundraising event, at which John serves as the announcer.

The owner of Professional Framing Services, John has been interested in the arts most of his life. He practiced music and art at an early age, and has continued through the years. "Art and music have contributed so much to my life and, as well, to many friendships."

Growing up in the cattle business was an education in itself, says John. Additionally, he went on to study art, engineering, and psychology at various schools, eventually focusing his studies at SRJC and Sonoma State University, and graduating with an M.A. from San Francisco State University in 1976. Later that year, he became a licensed

MFT and practiced in Mill Valley, San Rafael, Novato, and Petaluma. Along with his practice, John joined the staff of Columbia Pacific University in 1981, became Director of Counseling Services, and later promoted to Dean of Admissions.

John moved to and settled in Petaluma in the late 1960s, moving to Cotati in 1992. Wanting to change careers, John returned to the arts, working in frame shops in Novato and Petaluma. He opened his own frame shop in Novato in 1991, and has operated his Cotati business for the past 22 years. His specialty is working with family heirlooms and fine art.

John's expertise in restoration, conservation, and preservation has proven invaluable to CHS. When he looks at art works and collectibles he "understands" the canvas, the textiles, the paper, and the objects as well as what it will take to maximize their longevity.

Conservation, he warns, "only slows the process of degradation, it cannot stop it. Nothing lasts forever!"

John likes to think of the present as being "Future History." He feels we are all part of history here and now, and encourages others to become more involved, so that 50 years from now, they too will be one of those in the photos their grandkids will see and cherish.
