THE CHS MISSION

The Sad Story of Cotati's Skilling Family

On March 20, 1954, Lee Turney crashed the 1947 Chevrolet Fleetwood Sedan in a tragic automobile accident that killed his friend 17-year-old **Neil Skilling**.

They hit a tree on Redwood Highway near Cinnabar School north of Petaluma. Neil was pinned in the right front seat while Lee was thrown through the windshield. Lee's younger brother Jerry (Gerald) a passenger riding in the back seat, was thrown 50 feet from the accident site and suffered major internal injuries but survived the crash.



Almost to the date, two years later, in March 1956, Neil's older brother, **Robert** (Bob), age 23,

was killed when the tractor he was operating overturned, pinning him beneath it. Bob, a Navy veteran, was employed by Ken's Auto Body in Petaluma, had been married nearly a year, leaving behind his wife, Carol, and an infant daughter, Michelle. This

deadly event was witnessed by a younger brother, 15-year-old Gary.

Gary attended Cotati Elementary School and Petaluma High School. While he was a Trojan fullback, his teammates selected him as the team's most valuable player for the class of 1958. He was also picked by long time PHS football coach, Bill Abbey, for his 1941-1958 list of "Best Players."

After graduation, Gary joined the United States Marine Corps and was assigned duty on the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Bennington. On Christmas Day 1960, while the Bennington was berthed at Cubi Point, Subic Bay, Philippines Islands, Gary suffered an accidental fall while aboard. He died the next day

at the Subic Bay U.S. Naval Hospital.


He was the third and last of the Skilling boys to grow up in Cotati and die prematurely—four and six years after his brothers. All were survived by their parents, Clyde and Alma Skilling.

In 1961, as a tribute to the Skilling family, a group of Cotati residents led by the Cotati Civic Improvement

Committee and the Cotati Rotary raised funds to create a "living memorial" planter to honor the memory of the young men.



The planter and dedication plaque can still be found in the Cotati Plaza Park.

Annual Fourth Grade Field Trip Takes a Big Team

Thirty-seven fourth graders from Thomas Page Academy (and their chaperones) livened the Cotati Museum, as well as Cotati City Hall and Police Department on Wednesday, February 6, 2019, as part of the annual field trip meant to offer a Cotati slice of California history and to show how city government works.

This was the first such field trip by new Thomas Page teachers Janae Dedekam (4th grade) and Amy Miller (4th and 5th grade mixed), who were happy to add the experience to their curricula. Teachers, school staff, and parents ferried the students from and to school at 9 a.m. and 11:30.

The students were guided by CHS volunteers Judy Gustafson, Sandy Divine, Yvonne Van Dyke, and Marie Aggio to four learning stations staffed by additional volunteers and city employees. City department guide Lisa Moore worked with City Clerk Lauren Berges to explain how various offices serve Cotati citizens and businesses and plan for the future. Cotati Police Department liaison officer Katie Huldermann helped provide a look at policing from inside of the station.

Velma DiMeola, field trip coordinator, led students on a scavenger hunt through the museum to find information of Cotati's history and artifacts, and Marie McNaughton gave a Cotati history presentation created by Cathryn Fairlee. As always, Jerry Pagnusat captured the event on camera.

Along the way, students, parents, and teachers asked a number of good questions: **

Why is Cotati spelled so many ways?
Was there really a Chief Cotati?
Where was the Cotati speedway?
What is special about our Police Dept building?

Upon returning to school, each student also received a gift bag with a reusable eating utensil set from Recology Waste Management and materials from the police department and the historical society. These included instructions on how to write and submit an essay for the CHS annual history essay contest and a flyer about our upcoming barbecue fundraiser.

A CHS committee will read the student essays and pick one student to receive a \$50 prize and certificate at the April 7th BBQ. Honorable mentions will also receive certificates and all winning essays will be on display so that attendees can read and learn about Cotati history, especially the story of Rancho Cotate owner Thomas Page and his family. The classroom of the winning essayist also receives an additional \$100 reward.
