HISTORY NIGHT SET FOR NOV. 20

What was Cotati like in the 1920's? And the '30's? 40's? How about more recent years?

"Growing Up In Cotati" will be the theme of a History Night program sponsored by the Cotati Historical Society on Thursday, Nov. 20 at 7 p.m. in the Cotati Room behind the Ray Miller Memorial Community Center. The public is welcome and refreshments will be served. Admission is free but donations are appreciated.

Cotati has changed tremendously over the years, growing from a tiny rural farming community to a college town and bedroom community, and now a vigorous city. The speakers will reflect how those changes have affected local families.

Appearing on the program Lena Braden, who was born in Cotati 92 years ago and has lived here all her life. Others on the program are Jennie Falletti, Harold Griffith, Connie Revard Martin, Gary Santero, Pat Rippin, Archie Stewart and the sons of Vito Paulekas: BB, Phreekis and Sky Paulekas.

Audience members will have an opportunity to ask questions, so if there are things you've always wondered about Cotati, this is a chance to get answers.

COTATI'S FIRST POST OFFICE?

This wonderful old photo was sent to us by two different relatives of George Antone Miller, who was Cotati's second Postmaster, serving from July 2, 1895 until Dec. 30, 1902. Mr. Miller is the man standing in front of the door. Location of this building is not known, but it was probably on the west side of LaPlaza. IT'S A MYSTERY

It has a long wooden handle, heavy metal blade shaped like a big S, with sharp cutting edges on the bottom. None of the Veronda-Falletti family know what its use might have been, but someday, it may be in the Cotati Museum. A **free year's membership** in the Cotati Historical Society will be given to the person or persons who can identify this relic and explain its use.

VERONDA-FALLETTI RANCH PRESERVED

Final papers were signed last week transferring to the City of Cotati ownership of the Veronda-Falletti Ranch, the picturesque acreage across East School Street from Cotati City Hall,

The sale was arranged through the Sonoma County Agricultural Preservation and Open Space District; approved by the Cotati City Council on August 27 and by the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors on September 2. At that meeting, a video of the property was shown by Andrea Mackenzie of the Open Space District, indicating that the property could become a museum of local farming. Supervisor Mike Kerns stated that he had felt for years that Central Sonoma County needed such a museum, and he was delighted with the project.

Jennie Falletti's parents, Pete and Elizabeth Veronda, bought the property in 1938, and it has remained in family ownership since then. The Verondas raised chickens there in a typical Cotati ranch setting. In recent years, Jennie Falletti and her husband Al have raised sheep on the property. The sheep remain, and are now being cared for by city staff.

Cotati City Manager Dianne Thompson notes that the next step will be producing a plan for developing a city park-museum. This won't happen overnight, and will be done with lots of community participation.

As the property is now owned by the City of Cotati, anyone who wants to enter the ranch must have signed a waiver with the city. City Engineer Damien O'Bid is the person to contact about entering the property. The waivers must be obtained from Jone Hayes, Cotati Finance Director.

In answer to your question, yes, even Jennie Falletti had to sign a waiver.

Memorial Fund

At this time of year it's appropriate to remember that the Cotati Historical Society has a Memorial Fund – a wonderful idea suggested at this time last year by the family of Elaine Thomas. Many friends and relatives memorialized Elaine in this way, and the Society plans to use this fund for future educational projects in our future museum.
