HISTORICAL WALKING TOUR **SET FOR OCTOBER 25**

Sunday, October 25 has been selected as "Celebrate Cotati History Day" with a walking tour of the downtown with historian **Prue Draper** recounting the "stories behind the history" of many of our older business structures. Local restaurants are joining in the celebration by participating in a "Dine & Donate" program -donating a percentage of customer purchases to the Cotati Historical Society.

So far, restaurants participating are Cafe Salsa, Redwood Café and Tiny Thai, each of whom has agreed to donate 10%. Other eating places who would like to participate are welcome, and may call **Terry Dutra**, 795-3977 for details.

Diners should take a coupon from the flyer included in this newsletter with them when they go for breakfast, brunch, lunch or dinner to one of the cooperating restaurants. The coupon will be attached to their meal receipt.

Unlike past walking tours which originated in the Plaza, this one will begin at Cotati City Hall, where visitors will get a sneak preview of the future Cotati

Museum. Starting time is 2 p.m. and the walk usually takes about an hour and a half. The tour will proceed around the central part of town, and end at the bandstand in the Plaza, where Mrs. Draper will answer questions.



That year, three old-time residents, all businessmen, were running for city council, and were so confident that they had already bought the champagne for their victory party.

To their amazement, and that of many citizens, all three were defeated by three Sonoma State students, **Annette Lombardi**, **Geoff Dunham and Steve Laughlin**. Their campaign platform and background profiles make fascinating reading. We are indebted to Mark for thinking of us, and are pleased to add the posters to our museum archives.

posters. We are also indebted to **Blair Hardman**, who has donated a copy of the not-very-famous song, **In Cotati**. Musically referring to "In Cotati, in Bodega and as faraway as Calistoga…" the song never hit the top ten, but it's also a welcome addition to our archives.

We Love a Parade

Parades have always been popular in Cotati, ever since the days when workers on the Cotate Rancho dressed up in white suits to march beside a giant white leghorn hen that flapped her wings along the parade route.

The tradition continues, and the Cotati Historical Society had entries in both the major parades of the 2009 summer season.

Jaime Llopis embellished his elegant 1939 Cadillac with red, white and blue bunting and flags and represented the society in the Penngrove Fourth of July Parade. Long-time Cotati resident **Jennie Falletti** was his passenger, and drew cheers from onlookers.

It won first prize in the Non-Profit Organization judging and a \$50 prize for the Historical Society.

Donors Help Assure an Orderly Museum

Planning to have our museum be not only historically interesting but efficiently organized, we decided that we needed to have, from the outset, an up-to-date archiving system. This required a computer, appropriate software, and someone willing and able to direct the process.

As has happened so many times in the long process of creating the Cotati Museum, people who care about Cotati came to our rescue.

Kit and Afton Tuveson donated a handsome HP computer and equipment to augment it.

Judy Gustafson, who grew up in Cotati and had recently retired from a career in an information technology position, volunteered to be our chief archivist and technical consultant.

The software was a challenge. We had researched systems used by other museums, in Sonoma County and across the country, and decided that Past Perfect 4 was what we needed. The cost was a problem: \$1500 seemed insurmountable as we continued to devote our resources to remodeling the museum room at City Hall. Suddenly, as if in answer to our prayer, another lifelong Cotati resident, **Mike Sheehan**, stepped forward and donated the needed dollars.

We are deeply grateful to all these contributors; thanks to their generosity and energy, we will be able to catalog our artifacts, archives and photographs in an appropriate way. The work has already started as museum opening day draws nearer.

Much Progress to Report on Museum

In our last newsletter, we asked everyone to visualize a grand opening for our museum room this fall. Will that happen? It's getting very close!

At the time of our successful chicken barbecue last spring, the museum floor was our biggest problem – in terrible shape, covered with ugly carpet cement, pierced with holes from previous uses. To the rescue came **Jeff Nelson of Trammell-Nelson Wood Floors**, who agreed to do the refinishing and provide needed materials for a price our barbecue had made us able to pay. He asked that we do the advance tasks, and a volunteer work group mobilized over a weekend and scraped and patched with vigor. The floor was finished in a week – the original old schoolroom floor - and it's beautiful!

Next came the painting, with **Dunn-Edwards** generously donating all the materials. **Jim Reaney**, who grew up in Cotati and is now a general contractor, stepped in to prime the walls, and **John Moore** brought all his painting experience, as well as the whole **Moore Family**, wife **Lisa** and kids **Richard**, **Rachel** and **Riley** to handle the elaborate finishing job - many hours of hard work. **Paul Harvey** replaced worn old trim and windowsills to produce a neat finish, and **Sue Harvey** demonstrated her considerable skill and energy with a paintbrush, and then cleaned the floor to return it to gleaming condition.

Next will be the light fixtures; ceiling fixtures (old-fashioned suspended globes) have arrived and track lights are coming. **Johny Kistenmacher, of Aladdin Electric**, who has already done the basic wiring, is ready to begin the finishing touches. **Sue Harvey** is painting the outside corridor and work has started on preparing the supply closet-docent workroom.

In other words, in answer to that oft-heard question: "When will the museum open?" we can now say with confidence....Soon – very soon. Stay tuned!
