WHAT A "GRAND" **MUSEUM OPENING!**

Any fear we may have had that people wouldn't attend our museum grand opening on Feb. 28 disappeared even before the starting hour of 2 p.m. People were lined up outside, flocked in enthusiastically, and mingled with old friends as they pored over the displays and admired the work that had gone into converting the old police department office at Cotati City Hall into a museum.

About 400 people filled the hallways as well as the museum, and shared coffee and cookies as they inspected photos, scrapbooks and artifacts, listened to accordion music, and watched a slide show of the process of creating a museum. They had come from as far away as Hollister,

Vacaville, Lucerne, Palo Alto, San Rafael, and all parts of Sonoma County. Several were descendants of Dr. Thomas Stokes Page, owner of the former Cotati Rancho land grant. Many were new local residents eager to know more about their community.

Plans to hold a ceremonial cobweb cutting at the museum doorway had to be changed to accommodate the crowd. and the cobweb frame was moved to the city council chambers. where there was standing room only. Mayor Robert Coleman-Senghor welcomed the visitors and introduced city council members; City Manager Dianne Thompson commended the Cotati Historical Society for producing the museum, and Carole Mills represented State Senator Mark Leno and read a certificate of recognition. Gaye LeBaron, well-known columnist, author, teacher and historian, spoke on the importance of preserving a community's history and cited the growing national trend to establish local museums. Prue Draper, society president, led a champagne toast to celebrate with the crowd, and thanked all the many volunteers who have made the museum a reality.
