Marilee Shipman - Volunteer Extraordinaire

arilee Shipman came to Cotati in 1978 to attend Sonoma State University, and lucky for us, she is still here!

Being a docent provides her the opportunity for lifelong learning and she enjoys storytelling. Most of all, Marilee enjoys hearing the wonderful stories from visitors to the museum as they share their fondest memories of Cotati. She delights in seeing their faces light up when they first walk into the museum, seeking to fill in the gaps, as they recollect their own historical journeys either living or visiting here.

One of her favorite recent interactions was meeting a lively nonagenarian at this year's Chicken BBQ. Accompanied by three generations of family, she giggled when they found her elementary class photo on display from the 1930's. When asked where in Cotati she grew up, it turned out to be a century's old house Marilee knew well - built when the family immigrated here from Finland. As she puts it, "what a thrill to learn the backstory of the unusual house that's part of my daily walk."

Marilee looks forward to her docent shifts because "you never know who will step through that door - whether a relative of Dr. Thomas Page from Chile, or a young family exploring the museum after attending the Fall Open House about Veronda-Falletti Ranch." As she puts it, "Cotati is the little town that's so big on charm and so strong on character, it's unique among its neighbors. If that's weird, then that's a good thing!"

arie grew up on the family ranch on Stony Point Road across the street from the Washoe House. She was the baby in the family with one sister and three brothers. She went to school at Dunham Elementary and rode the school bus to attend Petaluma High, graduating in 1961. Marie moved to Cotati in 1960 when her mom and dad had the first house built off School Street. This was the only house at the edge of the Christensen Ranch that was later turned into a housing development on East School Street. She started working for Bank of America right after graduation and worked there until retiring after 40 years.

She was a willing helper for years to the Crane family at the Crane Melon Barn. She also helped with estate sales that were located at the Crane Melon Barn. Marie's great joy was being a docent at the Cotati Museum, volunteering at the annual chicken BBQ, and many years for the fourth-grade field trip to City Hall by Thomas Page Academy. The first person called when there was a need for clerical assistance was our beloved Marie. She was always ready to make delicious batches of cookies for CHS gatherings. Marie passed away in September at her home in Cotati at the age of 81.

Though her passing was sudden, Marie lived each day with love, grace, and generosity. Her warm smile, kind spirit, and giving heart touched everyone and will be deeply missed by all who knew her.

We currently have 40 followers on Facebook and 135 on Instagram. And our numbers are growing each week and with each posting.






Update on Veronda-Falletti Ranch Plan
